The <u>Hawai'i Bicycling League</u> (HBL), <u>Kauai Path</u>, <u>Maui Bicycling League</u> (MBL), and <u>People for Active Transportation Hawaii</u> (PATH) emailed candidates for election in Hawaii across eight contests including: State Senator, State Representative, County Councils statewide and Mayor in Hawai'i County and Honolulu. Complete Streets Initiative

Support for Complete Streets is: 5

From 1-5 (least to most)

Additional Complete Streets Comments: The Hawaii County Council recently passed a bill allowing DPW to limit the location of bicycle tours on our streets. I would work to amend this bill to ensure that it does not serve as a precedent for limiting multi-modal transportation on our county roads. In District 1, our infrastructure is failing, making all modes of transportation difficult. When elected, I intend to bolster our public transportation options, including covered bus stations (of which are limited), provide shoulders on roadways, and increase reflectors for visibility along our rural streets. We are a district that is very rural and communities are isolated, making it even more important that our roadways are safe and accessible to all.



Vision Zero Initiative

Additional Vision Zero Comments: District 1 contains most roads in limbo, which are poorly maintained at best and severely neglected at worst. The county is ignoring the final ruling on these roads, significantly risking the health and safety of all who pass through District 1. There is a critical need to make our roads safer to prevent needless death and injury, and it all starts with roads in limbo. We can also use data-driven solutions to make our roadways safer, while paving roads in limbo.

Support for Emission Reduction Efforts is: 4

Additional Emission Reduction Comments: Expanding bicycle lanes and pathways, along with protecting multi-modal transportation options from attempts to limit such advancements, is something I would prioritize if elected. The DPW should not be allowed to select roadways that are off-limits to cyclists and, when elected, I will prioritize protecting multi-modal transportation from these types of legislative attacks.
