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2024 Hawai'i Active Transportation Candidate Survey



The <u>Hawai'i Bicycling League</u> (HBL), <u>Kauai Path</u>, <u>Maui Bicycling League</u> (MBL), and <u>People for Active</u> <u>Transportation Hawaii</u> (PATH) emailed candidates for election in Hawaii across eight contests including: State Senator, State Representative, County Councils statewide and Mayor in Hawai'i County and Honolulu. Complete Streets Initiative

Support for Complete Streets is: 5

From 1-5 (least to most)

Additional Complete Streets Comments: Work in partnership with State and Federal legislators to adequately fund and implement complete street assets (enhanced mass transit capacity, regional transit hubs, pedestrian safety features, alternative bikeways and paths) as communities grow and in an effort to reduce traffic congestion and provide alternative means of travel.

Vision Zero Initiative

Support for Vision Zero is: 5

Additional Vision Zero Comments: Identify and implement policies and projects that prioritize safety of our roads. Work with community nonprofits that promote and provide road safety education. Help to reimplement the Hawaii County Traffic Safety Council. Collect and analyze data from community partners that helps to guide informed decision-making about infrastructure projects and enforcement needs.

Additional Comments About Public Transportation Use: Unfortunately this really only happens for me while traveling in metropolitan areas in the U.S. Mass transit routes in rural communities of Hawaii County are inconsistent and don't always meet the needs of residents where commuting distances are great.

Additional Comments About Active Transportation: Actively engage with the Waimea Stream Trail project as a volunteer and regular user.

Additional comments:

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Unfortunately for the third year in a row, the Waimea Stream Trail project was not successful in acquiring a federal grant to install proper bridges and pave the first portion. We were successful, however, to receive support from PONC as we identified a route to extend the trail towards the coast and potentially connect with Ala Kahakai. The County will now begin negotiations for easements. We also have an opportunity to strengthen our public access programs while designing and implementing road infrastructure projects that prevent injury and provide equitable access for all roadway users.
