Complete Streets Initiative

Support for Complete Streets is : 5

Additional Complete Streets Comments: I would start with adding flashing light signals at all crosswalks and intersections within one hundred feet of schools, churches, gyms, parks, bus stops, and community centers. At major traffic intersections and in high density areas, create diagonal pedestrian crosswalk signals, where auto traffic from all directions stops to allow pedestrians safe passage straight across or at a diagonal. Vision Zero Initiative

Support for Emission Reduction Efforts is: 5

Additional Emission Reduction Comments: Increase transportation route stops so that there is increased accessibility to critical county locations and resources (social security office, BMV, healthcare resources, etc). Make bus stops more accessible and welcoming to all people and during various weather conditions, especially with weather coverage for sun, precipitation, consideration of flood zones, etc. Retrofit and adapt infrastructure for multimodal transportation.
